### **Barton Baptist Church**

In the last few weeks the world has paused to remember the liberation of Auschwitz on the 27<sup>th</sup> of January 1945. The survivors have told of the horrors they faced and how they survived against all the odds. The recurring theme from these survivors was their determination to make sure these terrible atrocities are not forgotten and to honour those lives lost by living their own lives to the full. In May last year the novelist Judith Kerr died at the age of 95. After a childhood of terror and death threats in Nazi Germany, she escaped to Britain and eventually became one of the most successful children's illustrators in the world. Her most famous books are the "The Tiger Who Came To Tea" and the "Mog" books about a cat. She married her husband in 1954 at Chelsea Registry Office. They bought a flat in Kensington and painted all the walls in bright colours. As she commented on this time in her life, "nothing to eat except dried egg, but you hadn't been killed and you could work at anything you liked". Her husband died in 2006 after 52 years of marriage. With pragmatism she remarked, "Happy marriages make stronger widows" Even in her 90s, Judith Kerr loved to work, and always said her greatest fear was becoming too old to write. The thought of taking it easy never occurred to her. As she said: "If you've got a life that so many people didn't have, you can't waste it" As Christians we too should live our lives to serve Christ, to honour Him through our work, to share His love with others, to be kind and generous and value our time as precious and God-given. In Colossians 3v23 it says, 'whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving'. *Alison Foster.*

**East West Railway Company will be running a series of community events in venues across the area between Bedford and Cambridge.**

In January, the Preferred Route Option for the section of East-West Rail between Bedford and Cambridge was announced by the Secretary of State for Transport, the Rt. Hon. Grant Shapps MP. It would link existing stations in Bedford and Cambridge with communities in Cambourne and the area north of Sandy, south of St. Neots.

Everyone living and working in the area or with an interest in the railway is invited to join the East West Railway Company team at any of the events being held in February and March this year. You will be able to find out more about the Company, talk about the next steps for the railway, share your views, and meet experts from across the East West Railway Company.

### **Barton Wildlife Group Report**

These days we are hearing a lot about the need to plant as many trees as possible to try in some way to mitigate the relentless deforestation that is taking place in various parts of the world. But tree planting initiatives are not new to this village. In 1984 the Radford's, who had decided to farm the Burwash estate organically, set aside around two acres of land adjacent to the Drift for the creation of 'Side Hill Spinney', where they planted a selection of native British trees, blending more common varieties, such as ash, field maple, hazel and oak, with the lesser known wayfaring tree, wild service and spindle trees.

In 2000, the Countryside Restoration Trust planted their three-acre 'Millennium Wood', adjacent to an older plantation that lies close to the eastern boundary of their land. The wood comprises native tree species, such as ash, oak and wild cherry, as well as native shrubs: guelder rose, dog rose and hawthorn. The CRT is

continuing their tree-planting initiatives with the establishment of a new community orchard close to Warner's Corner on the A603.

However, by far the biggest tree-planting project in our area is that of the Arbory Trust's Woodland Burial Ground. The land, totalling 39 acres, was acquired by the Trust in two stages: the South Glebe in 2000 and the North Glebe in 2009. The Forestry Commission have planted and continue to monitor an astonishing 10,000 trees in the South Glebe and 10,400 in the North Glebe. These comprise a wide range of native British species, including the more common silver birch, maple, dogwood and crab apple, and the less commonly seen hornbeam, whitebeam, wych elm, small leaved lime and many more. There is even a glade of Scots pines, for completeness. Whilst all these tree planting initiatives were undertaken for the sake of conservation and to foster bio-diversity, we now know that they will also be doing their bit towards reducing CO<sub>2</sub> in the atmosphere. *Annabel Keeler*
